Romans 1:8-15

We show how we <u>care</u> by our <u>consistent</u> <u>prayer</u>.

Paul's prayer is characterized by his <u>thankfulness</u>, <u>commitment</u> and <u>seeking an opportunity</u> to share the gospel.

We are <u>all impacted</u> by sharing the Good News.

- <u>Transformed</u> by the Gospel
- Mutually encouraged as Brothers and Sisters in God's family
- Participating in unity in sharing the Good News

We should feel an <u>obligation</u> and <u>eagerness</u> to share the Good News.

What does my prayer life look like for the church? And for the lost?

Am I burdened with that same sense of obligation to share the Good News?

Is that my passion? Am I eager, or is my effort pretty meager?

- 1. Why does Paul, an apostle with an unparalleled pedigree of commitment see 2 Cor 11:22-12-10, 2 Cor 12:11-12 -- approach the Roman church with such gentleness and deference? What do we take away from that?
- 2. How would you summarize the "Gospel" to someone who has not heard it?
- 3. It's been said, "People don't care how much you know, until they know how much you care." What are examples of this in your life? How might this apply to your sharing of the Gospel?
- 4. In what way does your prayer life reflect your priorities? Given this lens, how do you think you should or should not adjust your prayers?
- 5. We often think of sharing the Gospel as a "missional" practice. In what ways, is it ALSO both "theologically" and "relationally" impactful?
- 6. What does Paul mean when he says he is "under obligation" in Romans 1:14? Do you feel under obligation if so, to whom and why?
- 7. In Romans 1:15, Paul says he is "eager to preach the gospel." (ready, willing, zealous, passionate) Would you characterize yourself as "eager?" What needs to change that would increase your eagerness to share the good news of Jesus?
