- 1. Read Joel 2:13-14. How does the surety of God's judgment comfort you or make you uneasy?

- 3. Have you ever struggled with wondering if God's judgment and hell was unfair or overly harsh? How have you worked through this issue?
- 4. Read Joel 3:15-17. How do the events of the day of the Lord echo throughout the crucifixion of Jesus (see Matthew 27:33-54)? Why do you think there's a correlation?
- 5. How does it change our view of God's judgment to know that God incarnate was mocked, beaten, and crucified in our place?
- 6. Read Joel 3:18-21. What stands out to you about this passage? What is the significance of the fountain coming from the temple? (see also, Revelation 21:6, 22:1-5; John 4:13-14; John 7:37-38)
- 7. Read Joel 3:19-21. Why do you think the book of Joel ends on a note of God's vengeance? What's the significance of this?
