## LOST AT SEA

Jonah 1:4-16

• We are <u>lost</u> without <u>God</u>.

• We demonstrate how lost we are when...

...we **<u>fail</u>** to see God's <u>**hand**</u> in all things.

...we **<u>ignore</u>** His <u>calling</u> in our life.

...we rely on **anything** other than our **<u>identity</u>** in Him.

• We are found when we <u>humble</u> ourselves and <u>worship</u> Him with awe.

- 1. Have you been out at sea in a storm? Describe the feelings you experienced.
- Read Jonah 1:1-16. Do you see yourself in the actions and attitudes of Jonah and the sailors? Is it easy to criticize Jonah without examining our own heart? Psalm 51
- 3. How does the sailors' reaction to the storm reflect common human responses to crisis situations?
- 4. What role does divine providence play in the sailors' attempt to determine the cause of the storm using casting lots?
- 5. In what ways can we relate Jonah's situation to our own lives when we try to escape God's calling or guidance?
- 6. In what ways does this part of the story point to Jesus' sacrifice? How is it different?
- 7. What lessons can we draw from this passage about the importance of repentance and God's willingness to extend grace and forgiveness to those who turn back to Him?
