THE LOVING FATHER

MALACHI 2:17-3:5

The loving God of JUSTICE will send the Messiah to purify His people for service and to JUDGE unbelievers for their sins.

The complaint: How does a JUST God allow INJUSTICE?

(v. 2:17)

- The problem: No one can MEASURE up to the righteousness of God. (v. 3:2a)
- Ш. The solution: God will FULFILL His covenant promise and send the perfect SACRIFICE to reconcile believers to Himself.

(vv. 3:1-3a)

IV. The purpose: to separate His people for SERVICE and WORSHIP.

(vv.3:3b-4)

The resolution: God will judge and PUNISH unbelievers for their evil deeds. (v. 3:5)

- 5. Read verses 3:1 Who is the messenger? Who else is Malachi referring to in this verse? How does Jesus fulfill these prophecies? Rom. 3:26, Matt. 11:9-10, Is. 40:3, John 1:29, Zech. 13:9, Jer. 31:31-34, Luke 22:19-20, 2 Cor. 5:21,
- 6. What are we being saved TO? What is the purpose of God calling us into communion with Him? Mal. 3:3-4, Ezek. 20:40-42, Eph. 2:8-10, 1 Peter 2:9
- 7. Discuss God's final judgment in Mal. 3:5. What are the deeds of the unbeliever? How does this challenge you to examine your own faith? How does it encourage you to share your faith with others? Lev. 19:13, Deut. 24:17, Matt. 3:11-12, Luke 4:16-21, Rom. 8:1
